

Parents, students, and staff at W.F. Kaynor Technical High School have been experiencing the same issue, busses have been continuing to show up later and later and the main problem is the bus driver shortage in Waterbury.

Some seniors who take the bus regularly commented on this major change.

"My bus is almost always second to last, and arrives about two hours after the final bell rings," said Ta'Janay Valle, senior.

According to Joshua Ramos, "My

bus comes [between] 3:00-4:30p.m., and [it arrives] either last or within the first five [minutes]."

Mr. Friedman discussed plans for a resolution to students waiting such long hours for their bus to arrive. He said, "I'd say, at this time, there isn't a definitive date for when all the busses will arrive here on time."

"We will continue to work with Waterbury. Progress is happening, it's just taking a lot longer than we expected," he added.

Durham School Services allotted Kaynor Tech. 3 busses that regularly arrive ontime for student dismissal.

Devious Licks Trend: TikTok Challenge Turns Destructive



Students at Kaynor have been participating in a TikTok trend to gain popularity on social media by vandalizing school property.

Ever since the trend went viral, many schools have been trying to combat stolen or damaged property. Some schools have started locking bathrooms or providing students with only virtual class options or taking disciplinary action to prevent further damage/ destruction.

There have been cases across the country where law enforcement has been involved. Senior, Oliver Gomes said he is disappointed in the behavior of his peers. "Kaynor has an atmosphere of respect and maturity [and] this trend is starting to ruin its atmosphere. This trend offers the opportunity to become famous online but with no positive impact on our lives, only negative," he said.

"There have been two incidents at Kaynor one being the soap dispensers in the boys bathroom being taken and a teacher having one of her class decorations taken," according to security guard Eugene Bertrand.

"We have been trying to isolate the incidents and [are] being more careful now and, thankfully, it has been working," Bertrand added.

Former superintendent Jeffery Wihbey weighed in saying, "I am disappointed that these viral challenges have made their way to CTECS schools as they go against everything we strive for and value in a school environment."

Wihbey added, "Our goal at all CTECS locations is to foster a positive school culture and climate where everyone feels safe and respected. With that in mind, we will not tolerate these types of pranks at our schools."

Some districts have responded by suspending and expelling students, installing additional cameras or limiting students bathroom breaks.

At Kaynor, the boys bathrooms on all but the first floor have been closed and according to Assistant Principal, Dr. Celadon, administrative action will be taken if students damage property.

State Police Sergeant Brian Mohl was working in Woodbury when his stateissued patrol cruiser became engulfed by the floodwaters of the Pomperaug River.

Potential Shift in Math Curriculum: ALEKS Program May Be Out

The Assessment and Learning in Knowledge Spaces (ALEKS) Program is an on-line math program that the Connecticut Technical Education and Career System has used for many years.

After the current student body has graduated there is a rumor that the ALEKS program will no longer be utilized.

The district may be deciding to revert back to previous ways of teaching. Since the inception of the ALEKS Program there have been students that have excelled in math via an on-line learning platform that is self paced, and there have been those that prefer traditional modes of teaching (face-to-face) learning.

While the ALEKS Program has the benefit of a self-paced, studentcentered learning structure, many

students are hung up on the drawbacks of use of an on-line platform.

In a post-covid-19 learning environment many students are yearning for the personal connection, rather than simply interacting with a screen via an on-line program.

The students that meet check-points along the way in their math courses do well, however, some students that fall behind have learned that their lack of "completion" can take a toll on their math grade.

"ALEKS isn't preparing us for college, it's just preparing us for the next test," senior Ahmed Shabbaz said.

Shabbaz added, "My friends that graduated recently said the ALEKS Program did not prepare them for college and/or career." Mrs. Amy Tavares said she thinks the ALEKS Program "shows where

my students struggle and where they need help. A traditional math class could never do that."

"The ALEKS Program is a highly effective program when implemented properly," according to Mrs. Darlene Marks, junior and senior math teacher.

Junior, Jazmin Morales said, "Even though ALEKS isn't a bad program, a normal math class would be more beneficial to students."

The Related Education Department Head, Mrs. DelPiano weighed in saying, "The way we used ALEKS in the beginning was different than how we wanted to use it."

"As a tool to assess if students have mastered things, it's very beneficial. The way we rolled it out, we didn't necessarily do the best that we could have," DelPiano added.



Since the return to school after the Covid-19 hybrid schedule, some students have found it difficult to follow the dress-code.

Many students are up in arms about not being able to wear ripped jeans or crocs, for instance.

The administrative team at Kaynor has made it known that they will be strictly enforcing the dress-code, even stopping by during homeroom to check that students are in compliance.

Senior, Ta'janay Valle argues, "I get why we have to wear a school shirt with [a] Kaynor Tech [logo] on it, as it's a state school, but why can't we wear cardigans or flannels that don't have Kaynor [logos]?"

The school uniform has many options to choose from. There are multiple color options for shirts and sweatshirts, hoodies, fleeces, jackets and other items that can all be purchased on-line.

There is also Spirit Wear Friday's

which allow students to wear their Kaynor team jersey, NHS shirts, Chorus shirts, Generation Leadership shirts, Strong award shirts, St. Baldrick's shirts, Students are encouraged to wear clothing of their choice on dress-down days as long as it is school-appropriate.

We use dress-down days not only to boost school morale but, to also raise money for school and/or class events. Dress-down days are administration-approved events/ fundraisers.

Students are not allowed to wear crocs because according to the Student Handbook they are considered footwear "that damages or marks the floor."

Per the 2021-2022 Student Handbook, under "Student Dress and Grooming, Including Uniforms, prohibited from wear, #3," the handbook details that the following items are prohibited: "Footwear that damages or marks floors or that is a safety hazard, including backless

that is a safety hazard, including backless shoes, flip-flops, and toeless shoes, crocs, heelies or slippers."

For students in some shops, the enforcement of this rule is frustrating since they were allowed to wear crocs in the past.

According to CT Insider, new laws regarding recreational marijuana, smoking, employment, driving, and more, have taken effect in Connecticut as of Oct. 1, 2021. Below is a breakdown of the new laws:

1. For the first time, medical marijuana patients will be allowed to grow marijuana in their own homes with a maximum of 12 plants per household, 6 per person. Marijuana smoking is now treated as if it were a cigarette with minimum restrictions on where it can be smoked.

2. Employers will no longer be allowed to ask for a graduation year or birth date on their initial application. This new move protects especially older yet experienced adults who are often discriminated against jobs based on their age.

3. Drivers will be required to stop if a pedestrian is within any part of the crosswalk, steps to the curb at a crosswalk's entrance and shows intent to cross.

4. "Tristan's Law" requires drivers to proceed with caution when passing an ice cream truck, it also prohibits ice cream trucks from serving in high traffic areas.

5. Backseat passengers over 16 must now wear a seatbelt. Before only those seated in the front and children were required to do so.

6. Employers are required to tell all job applicants how much they pay.

Although the aforementioned laws have been passed, there are some that have been signed and will take effect at a later date.



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
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
